Ms. Sayre holds a Bachelor of University Studies with emphasis in English, sociology, and history from Eastern New Mexico University, and completed some course work toward a Masters in Computer Information Systems at Bentley University, Waltham, Massachusetts.

Richard G. (Rick) Sayre, Certified Genealogist, Certified Genealogical Lecturer, and Utah Genealogical Association Fellow, is a long-time researcher and instructor in genealogical topics at the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University and co-coordinates genealogy courses at Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy and Genealogical Institute of Pittsburgh with Judy Russell (The Legal Genealogist) and Pam Sayre. His areas of expertise include records of the National Archives, the

Bureau of Land Management, and the Daughters of the American Revolution. Rick's areas of concentration include military records, land records, using maps in genealogy, urban research, and government documents. Maps enable genealogists to understand more about an ancestor's migration, community, and occupation. In this hands-on two hour workshop, students will learn about traditional and online resources for finding historical, topographical, birds-eye view and other maps, how to interpret the maps' symbols and notations, and how to correlate other information with map data to pace an ancestor in time and place.

In on-line demonstrations, attendees will see some of the myriad sites for finding and downloading appropriate maps. For hands-on exercises, attendees will be provided with hard copies of maps, documents, and other tools to be used in correlating deeds, censuses, newspaper articles, or other documents with maps to solve genealogical problems using various kinds of maps, from deed plats to land ownership maps to panoramic maps. Demonstrations and exercises will include a mix of rural and urban problems and solutions.

NEW HistoryGeo Land Records and Maps Database Elizabeth Stepp

GFO has a new, powerful resource tool on our computers! It's HistoryGeo.com, and it contains millions of easy-to-look up landowner records. Voted as one of the best websites of 2015 by Family Tree magazine, their software provides powerful and easy-to-use tools for finding where ancestors owned land. Their interactive map, searchable by surname, state, and county, contains over 12.3 million landowner records, with links to other public databases such as The Bureau of Land Management. All 29 of the public land states in the continental U. S. and Texas are covered. And, there's an antiques map collection. "Jim Morrow has such an important role in getting the Bulletin and the Insider to our members in a timely manner. He assists with printing, labeling, and arranging for pickup of the publications to take to the Post Office.

Jim serves as a Research Assistant on Tuesday afternoons, is our backup printer, keep us stocked with the publications we sell, and helps with research requests. He previously served as our facilities manager and was a key player when we relocated in 2011."

Jim reminisced about his 20 years working in the print shop: overseeing the printing and hand assembling the 1400 copies that were mailed to members (this was before the computer age when members could receive publications electronically).

Hand assembly of publications meant walking around the table, picking up a page from each stack of copies, then stapling and preparing the copies to mail. In addition, paper would occasionally stick to the masters, which required taking the printer apart to remove and clean the machine before being able to continue printing. One machine that was used required that the numerous rollers be removed and cleaned and ink removed at the end of the day, all of which took over an hour to complete.

A fabulous reason to be a member and go to the GFO is the help given by other members. One day, I had a circle pedigree chart opened on the table next to my computer. Larry Robbins stared at it and remarked, "There's a person with the name Robbins. Too bad it's his first name. You know, my last name is Robbins."

"Well, Larry, if you'll look at his mother, her maiden name was Robbins." He studied my chart for a minute or two. Then remarked that he might have some information for me.

The next time I saw him, he handed me a scholarly two-part article from the *New England Historical and Genealogical Register* that untangled the confusion about the Robbins names in that family. I knew so little about the family that I wasn't even knowledgeable enough to be confused. Thanks, Larry Robbins!
