Topics

- **Genetic Genealogy: Beginner Basic** – Are you new at DNA testing for genealogy, or do you need a refresher course? This presentation will help you understand the importance of DNA testing, the uses of the three types of DNA tests, and the basic terminology. Learn how to choose a testing company that fits your needs, what to do while you wait for your results, and then what to do with your results.
- **Autosomal DNA Testing** – Do you know all the cousins in your family who are interested in genealogy? Would you like to connect with more people who are researching your lines? This presentation will explain the advantages of autosomal testing, give you tips on contacting non-genealogist cousins or strangers for DNA testing, and show you how to use the autosomal data to find the common ancestor for your matches.

Emily Aulicino is a retired teacher and has been researching her family's genealogy for over 40 years. Those who have attended her presentations praise her for providing information that is easy-to-understand for any novice. She is the Regional Coordinator and Speaker of the International Society of Genetic Genealogists (ISOGG) for the states of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho. She manages thirteen DNA projects through Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) including seven surname projects, three genealogical society projects (financially benefiting each society), one haplogroup project, and three geographical projects. She established and chairs the DNA Interest Group for the Genealogical Forum of Portland.

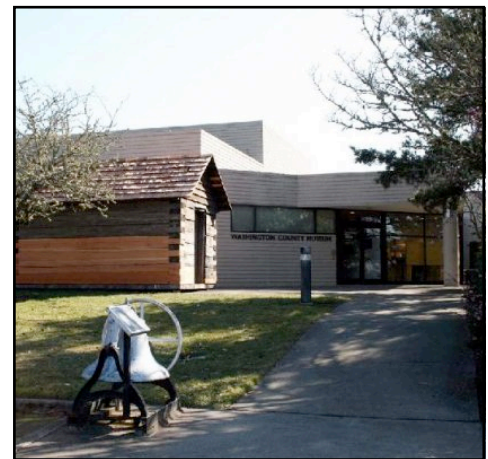

The monthly programs and many interest groups take a break during June, July, and August. If in doubt, you can find the schedule and contact list in each *Insider* and on the GFO website.

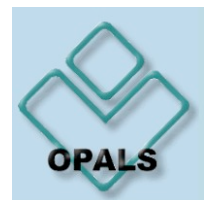
Lost and Found

Library Catalog Conversion to OPALS!

The Board has selected a new catalog system for the library – OPALS (**OP**en-source **A**utomated **L**ibrary **S**ystem), an open source program with hosting and support from the company Media Flex. This system is cloud and browser based and allows easy access from any computer with internet access. Firefox and Chrome are recommended browsers for administrative access, and for patrons Internet Explorer will work as well.



Conversion will take some months because we are doing substantial cleanup of the old catalog beforehand. To accomplish this, we have frozen the old catalog which will still be available for access in the reading room alongside the new catalog.

New items are currently being entered into the OPALS catalog, and once cleanup is done, the old catalog will be converted and merged with the new items. Check it out at [gfo.ind.opalsinfo.net!](http://gfo.ind.opalsinfo.net/)

GFO Hall of Fame 2013

Sandi Whiteman, Library Director

Many of us have had the good fortune to work on GFO activities with Sandi Whiteman in her position as Library Director and on many other projects she participated in for many years.

Sandi took her experience at Multnomah County Public Library and applied it to create an efficient system of acquisition and accession for Genealogical Forum of Oregon materials. She had originally volunteered to help with the periodicals but answered the call in April 2005 for the position of Library Director. Over the years we watched her develop and implement a plan to process the stream of new donations coming through the door into items to be accessioned, sold, or otherwise repurposed.

She directed many of the research assistants in proper labeling, stamping, and filing of various types of library records and kept the library shelf list current and up-to-date. To improve service to our patrons, Sandi developed interesting training



meetings for the research assistants in library operations. In addition, she implemented a system for storage and binding of periodicals and managed the repair of damaged books and periodicals by a professional book binder.

Sandi always had boxes of surplus books ready to go for sale at the GFO's semiannual seminars resulting in significant revenue for the society. She also organized various open houses, some of which included very successful surplus book sales.

As a member of the GFO Board of Directors, Sandi was always lobbying to improve the

society's planning process and to develop goals and strategies particularly as they pertained to library management. She was a member of many of the Board's committees, including budget, strategic planning, bylaws revision, and policy development.

The Genealogical Forum of Oregon is pleased to recognize Sandi Whiteman as an outstanding member with the 2013 Hall of Fame Award.

Manuscripts Go Digital

The GFO has a large and growing collection of personal papers and manuscripts donated by members over the years. 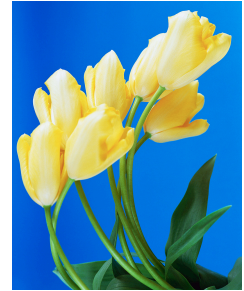
Congratulations to the winners, and thank you to all who participated. Look for these stories in the *GFO Bulletin*.

Digital Public Library of America

The vision of the DPLA, dp.la, is to be a national digital library bringing “different viewpoints, experiences, and collections together in a single platform and portal, providing open and coherent access to our society’s digitized cultural heritage.”

“The DPLA offers a single point of access to millions of items—photographs, manuscripts, books, sounds, moving images, and more—from libraries, archives, and museums around the United States. Users can browse and search the DPLA’s collections by timeline, map, format, and topic; save items to customized lists; and share their lists with others. Users can also explore digital exhibitions curated by the DPLA’s content partners and staff.”

A record returned in a search links to the original object on the content provider’s site. An interesting experiment is to search for “gold rush” and view the variety of objects listed in the results and the variety of providers.

2012 - 2013 Annual Appeal Report

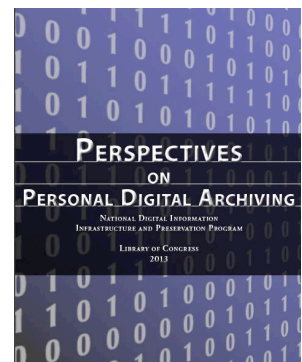

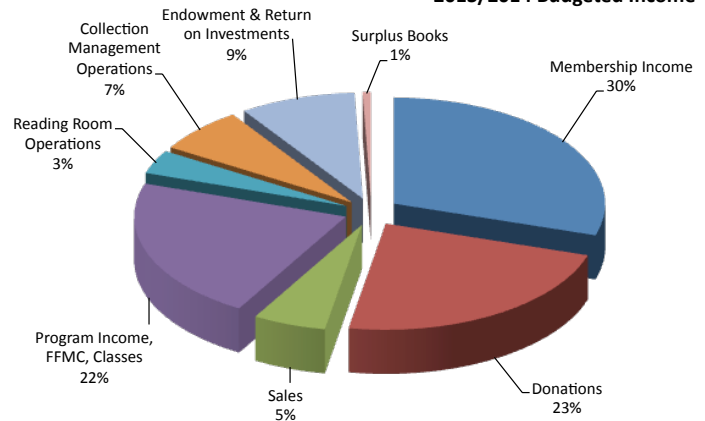

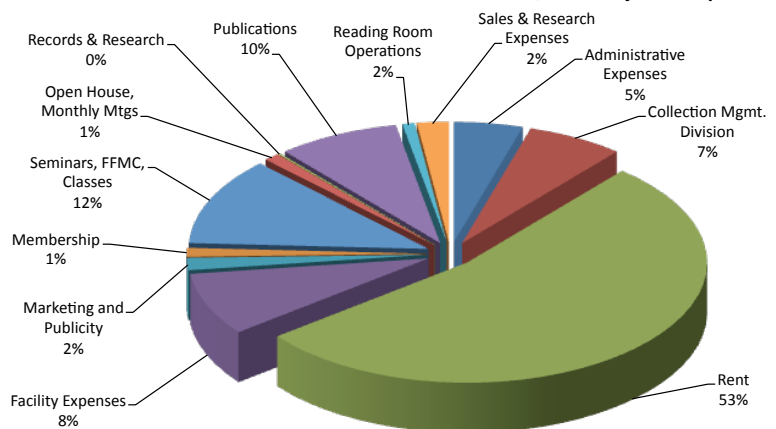

April Financial Report

The GFO checking account ended April with a balance of \$31,001.30. The GFO's money market account at Bank of America had a balance of \$8,856.12. Total deposits for the month were \$8,636.71, and expenses were \$9,227.25. Most of the activity was related to the Spring Seminar, the repair of the VeloBinder, purchase of the Newspapers.com annual subscription, payment for the library workroom light fixture installation, feeding the bulk mail account, and purchase of additional RAM for the manuscript committee's laptop.

The Endowment Fund committee restructured the accounts in both the Endowment Fund and the General Fund's holdings in mid April. Three new accounts were opened and one closed within the EF account. The value of the Endowment Fund as of the

end of April was \$155,977.88, and the General Fund balance was \$51,309.17. The EF Vanguard MM account had \$7,363.41.

May Financial Report

We ended the month of May 2013 with \$33,604.70 in the Wells Fargo checking account, \$8,856.52 in the BOA MM account, and \$51,132.21 market value in our Vanguard accounts. Total income was \$8,343.88, and expenses were \$5,423.93.

The annual transfer to the GFO from the Endowment Fund, calculated as \$6,100.00 based on the approved formula, was transferred in May.

The Endowment Fund ended the month with a value of \$154,406.45 and with \$1,263.43 in the MM account.
