



Reclaim The Records: Genealogy Fought the Law and Won

Genealogists are often told government archives records are “unavailable,” or they’re difficult to access. Reclaim The Records (RTR) won a Freedom of Information Law case against the NYC Municipal Archives to access twentieth century genealogical records, and another in New Jersey. Brooke Schreier Ganz, the founder of RTR, speaks about the cases, the legal basics of FOIL, and how to file a FOIL request for other records. Doors open at 6:30.

As the former Vice President of Gesher Galicia, she designed and built their website, including the “All Galicia Database.” The search engine codebase was released by Brooke as a free open-source project, for which she won second place in the 2012 RootsTech Developer Challenge. She further refined it to build the bilingual “All Israel Database” for the Israel Genealogical Research Association (IGRA).



WV Archives ~ Vital Records Resources

West Virginia Vital Research Records free online database, <http://www.wvculture.org/vrr>, is also included in ALE and FamilySearch. The database was created and is maintained by the Archives and History section (WV State Archives/Archives and History Library) of the WV Division of Culture and History.

The western Virginia counties that became part of West Virginia in 1863 kept their own records, so for those pre-1863 Virginia counties, regardless of statehood, you can search the West Virginia database for births from 1853 to current year minus 101 years (except the original few counties on the database that go through 1930), for deaths from 1853 to current year minus 51 years, and marriages from inception of each county to some point between 1960-70, depending on county. County birth and death records into the 1960s are available on LDS microfilm.

We also can provide uncertified copies of WV state birth and “delayed” birth certificates up through 1930 and WV state death certificates up through 1973. We have statewide annual indexes for state birth and death certificates for 1917 through 1991. We have annual indexes for state “delayed” birth certificates from 1853 (I think the earliest one is in the 1870s) to 1991. We have statewide annual indexes for marriages from 1921 (couple years are groom only) through 1991. There are also a few records available on microfilm that are not yet in the database due to transcription delays or other problems.

West Virginia has not lost any state birth, death, or marriage records. There are both old and new publications that contain this misinformation. No birth or death records were lost in the State Capitol fire in 1921. and marriage records were not kept by the

state until 1964. Regardless, West Virginia has had a parallel record system from the beginning of state records in 1917 into the present. Records continued to be kept by the counties as well as the state, so if you don’t find a state record you can double check by looking for the county record as well, and vice versa.

A guide to West Virginia Vital Research Records Database, plus Quick Guides for birth, death and marriage records are linked on the State Archives page under Staff Research Guides: <http://www.wvculture.org/history/archives/wvsamenu.html>. The WVRR guide is also linked from the main WVRR search page. Be sure to check the county list to the side of each category search page for date ranges available.

West Virginia vital records between 1853 and 1863 that are missing from the court house and from the West Virginia index are likely to be found at the Library of Virginia in Richmond. These include records for Preston, Hampshire, and Berkeley Counties. I found my ancestor Thorn(s)berry Bailey’s death record there; he died in Preston County in 1857.





Congratulations!

Kate Eakman who, among other activities, is co-editor of the GFO *Bulletin*, recently received the Association of Professional Genealogists' (APG®) Excellence Award for her article "Writing the Professional Research Report: Style and Format," in the September 2016 Quarterly.

The article talked about writing research reports, and although geared for genealogical professionals, is also appropriate for amateurs who are writing up their report findings, too.

She also gave two presentations at their annual conference in Washington, DC. First was a four-person poster and discussion session titled "I'm Afraid I Have Bad News" Providing Unpleasant Research Results

" – how to present things the client doesn't want to hear (you are NOT descended from a Cherokee Princess, etc.) She'll be presenting a similar topic at the 2018 Genealogy Jamboree, "How Dare You Say That? When You Discover Bad News about Your Family."

The second presentation, "Considering Client Expectations: Working with the Client to Form Realistic Project Goals," walked through the rationale and then the steps for working with the client to hammer out agreed-upon goals for genealogical research. She says it "sounds like a given, but too many clients say 'Do my genealogy' and expect their own personal version of 'Who Do You Think You Are?' for \$11.73!"

GFO Print Services

As one of the benefits of your membership, our print shop printer may be used for printing your family histories, family trees, reunion notices, or anything else. (Copyright laws must always be followed, so no books copied unless you wrote it!)

The cost for printing is: 1) cost of the paper used 2) \$0.03 per page printed; 3) if used: cost of bindings at \$0.90 per binding or cost of stapling at \$0.01 per staple; 4) a 15% outside job charge on the total amount. The cost is still less than Kinko's or Office Depot, etc.

To submit your print job, fill out a print request form (available at the receptionist's desk) and indicate when you need the job completed; then attach your job to the form.
