- Write an engaging story that future generations will enjoy, and
- Base your story on good, sound research.

Requirements

- Piece must be written to the theme: "Taking a Stand" tell the story of your ancestor, a hero in a conventional way or going against the tide.
- Your story must be factual, with suppositions clearly indicated.
- Documentation in the form of endnotes or footnotes is **required**.
- Length 2000 to 5000 words
- Story must be submitted in electronic form Word or RTF file, submitted as an email attachment or saved to a CD or floppy disk.
- Submitted from November 1, 2011 to February 1, 2012. Please do not submit before November 1st.
- Plan ahead and make a concerted effort to attend the award presentation at the GFO Monthly meeting on Saturday, April 14, 2012.

Judging Criteria

- A factual story built around the theme
- A story that engages the reader
- Good use of language, including smoothness of the writing
- Convincing research genealogical and background
- Well documented all facts are supported by evidence

Need Help?

- Attend GFO's Writers' Forum or other writing group, for feedback on your writing; or form your own group.
- Read Sharon Carmack's You Can Write Your Family History (Cincinnati, Ohio: Betterway Books, 2003).
- For citing sources: Elizabeth Shown Mills, *Evidence: Analysis for the Family Historian* (Baltimore, Maryland: Genealogical Publishing Company, 1997) and Elizabeth Shown Mills, *Evidence Explained* (Baltimore, Maryland: Genealogical Publishing Company, 2007).

LIBRARY GRAND OPENING: MY IMPRESSIONS by Marj Enneking

Early in the summer, the GFO Board members welcomed newly elected Laurel Smith to the Board, very pleased that she was willing to take on the challenge of increasing awareness of the GFO. We all agreed that a perfect time for a publicity campaign would be right after moving to our new location. Many ideas for activities were suggested, and Laurel was applauded for being willing to publicize them broadly. Laurel gently suggested that someone would need to step forward to organize and make sure that things actually happened, or there wouldn't be much to publicize. A long silence ensued, while the rest of us studiously avoided making eye contact with one another or Laurel. After all, we were already feeling already pretty overworked – serving on the committee to find a suitable new location, determining needed changes to the space to make it work as a library, negotiating with TriMet, the building owner, the moving specialists, architects and contractors; figuring out how we could afford the new space and pay for the costs associated with the move and needed improvements; sorting an amazing amount of "stuff" accumulated over the past 40 years by an organization full of people who tend to be "string savers"; organizing and boxing up the things to be moved and disposing of the rest; making plans to clean, paint and prepare our new space for the move; drawing up detailed plans of exactly what would go where; and a myriad of other tasks. Finally, Laurel sighed and said OK, she would try to get some events organized, since otherwise she would have nothing to publicize. And did she ever!

Starting with the September Monthly Program and ending with the October Monthly Program, special events or programs were offered on 27 of the 29 days. Ranging from a three-day Irish Heritage extravaganza to a group of Illinois researchers spending a whole afternoon huddled around tables with their computers, exploring websites to further their research efforts. Our special Interest Groups sponsored programs and events. Many other sister organizations sponsored days or provided speakers. GFO members made presentations, assisted with events, greeted visitors, and often just stepped in to help when they saw a need. Research Assistants were swamped with people to greet, questions to answer, requests for tours, and hundreds of people filling out visitor cards,

The Library has been a beehive of activity all month. We had almost 1200 visits during the Opening, evenly split between members and 408 non-member visitors. Members are pleased with the new facilities and lay out. Most can't believe that this new space is actually quite a bit smaller than our former space. Visitors are amazed at the wealth of resources and helpful people. The Board and interior planning committee are already working on needed fine-tuning and improvements of the facilities. We are off to a good start: The membership, which has hovered at about 850 over the past several months, now stands at 900. New memberships, which have averaged about 7 per month over the past three years, totaled 37 for September and first few days of October. Both renewal memberships, and reinstatements of long-time inactive members are up. Registration for the up-coming Fall Seminar is very positive - (there is still room, and time to register). The Education Committee is planning new classes and the Spring Seminar. The Research Assistants are planning to offer a variety of free informal workshops and introductory sessions to Library users.

The Library has been a busy and happy place. Thanks to all of you who have helped make it so.

PARKING AT GFO

Since our move to the historic Ford Building, there have been many questions, and a few difficulties, in regard to parking. There are three lots where visitors to the library may park. The one adjoining the building off of 11th has many spaces that are marked one hour parking. At this time, the one hour limit is not being enforced. There is another lot, across 11th Street, enclosed by a chain link fence. It is posted for permit parking only. This is also not currently being enforced. The third lot is on the northwest corner of 10th and Division. This lot also indicates permit parking only. While the permit requirement here is not being enforced, there are three spaces that are reserved for another tenant in the building. These spaces are marked Reserved Ste 118 and the tire curb is red. **PLEASE DO NOT PARK IN THESE SPACES.** These are the only spaces in the three lots mentioned where parking is restricted and if you park in them, your car will be towed. Please see the photo.

In the future, if building management begins to enforce the permit requirement or time limits, we will notify you via *The Insider* and at the reception desk as you enter the Library.

Please remember if you park in either of the lots off 11th Avenue, that the traffic is one-way headed south as you exit. Also, if you must park on the street, please look carefully at any signage to make certain parking is permitted, and for what length of time. We want your every visit to the GFO to be safe, pleasant, and productive.
