 - Slave Schedules for 1850 and 1860 (slave schedules generally name slave holders; slaves usually listed only by age, sex, and black/mulatto but not named)
 - Every name census indices 1790–1940 (formerly enslaved were first enumerated by name beginning in 1870)
 - 1890 Civil War Widows and Veterans Schedule
 - U.S. Freedmen's Bureau Records, 1865–1878
 - Freedman's Bank Records, 1865–1874 (bank depositor records of freed slaves from Alabama, Arkansas, District of Columbia, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Missouri, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, and South Carolina)
