## America's Westward Expansion: 25 Events in 50 Minutes\*

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\*Please note: this presentation includes disturbing topics of America's government-led expansion of slavery, and the land theft and subsequent forced migration, assimilation, and/or genocide of Mormon, Mexican, and Native American populations. I acknowledge that we here in the U.S. are residing on unceded tribal land of indigenous people whose ancestors inhabited this land thousands of years prior to our violent invasion.

**Objective**: To highlight major laws and events that contributed to America's westward expansion between 1787 and 1890, with a focus on territorial boundaries, slavery, and wars against Mexico and Native Americans.

- 1. **Northwest Ordinance** (1787) A Congressional act created the Northwest Territory from formerly British land following the American Revolution.
- 2. Louisiana Purchase (1803) Napoleon sold the Louisiana Territory (827,000+ mi<sup>2</sup>) to the U.S., doubling its size and extending its sovereignty across the Mississippi River.
- 3. Lewis & Clark Expedition (1804-1806) The Corps of Discovery was led by Lewis & Clark to explore and map the Louisiana Purchase land.
- 4. **Military Tract of 1812** A Congressional act set aside bounty land for War of 1812 soldiers to encourage settlement in the frontier.
- 5. **Missouri Compromise** (1820) Slavery was banned north of Missouri's southern border (excluding Missouri) but was allowed south of that border.
- 6. **Indian Removal Act** (1830) President Andrew Jackson ordered indigenous Americans from their land, with military members and volunteers imprisoning and slaughtering them, then marching those who remained along the Trail of Tears.
- 7. **Texas War of Independence** (1836) Many Mexicans & Texan Americans successfully battled for secession from Mexico, resulting in the Texas Republic.
- 8. **Oregon Trail** (1843) Missionary Marcus Whitman accompanied 1,000+ people, their wagons, and livestock on a 2,000+-mile route from the Missouri River to Oregon.
- 9. **Oregon Treaty** (1846) President James Polk's treaty ended joint British & American occupation of Oregon Country, and established the 49<sup>th</sup> parallel as the northwest border between the U.S. and Canada.

- 10. **Mormon trek to Utah** (1846) Brigham Young led 70,000+ Mormons from Illinois along the Mormon Trail and into Salt Lake City, Utah to escape religious persecution.
- 11. Mexican-American War (1846-1848) President James Polk's offer to purchase some of Mexico's land was rejected, leading to a border skirmish between the Mexican Calvary and U.S. troops. The U.S. gained present-day Arizona\*, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico\*, and Utah (\*except those portions later a part of the Gadsden Purchase) through the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo.
- 12. **California Gold Rush** (1848-1855) Gold was discovered at Sutter's Mill 9 days before the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo ceded California to the U.S.
- 13. **Compromise of 1850** Congress passed 5 separate laws to solve boundary disputes and the issue of slavery in California, New Mexico, Utah, and Washington, DC.
- 14. Indian Appropriations Act (1851) Native Americans were confined to reservations, freeing up their land for distribution to non-native, white settlers.
- 15. Gadsden Purchase (1854) President Franklin Pierce authorized James Gadsden's
  \$10 million purchase of 29,000 square miles of Mexican land in present-day southern Arizona and New Mexico, creating a new border between Mexico and America.
- 16. **Kansas-Nebraska Act** (1854) President Pierce's act created the Kansas Territory and Nebraska Territory, repealing the 1820 Missouri Compromise's border between free & slave states and mandating "popular sovereignty."
- 17. **Pike's Peak Gold Rush** (1858-1861) The discovery of gold occurred in the area of present-day Denver, Colorado and attracted 100,000+ settlers from across the U.S.
- 18. **Pony Express** (1860-1861) A mail-delivery system that spanned 2,000+ miles between Missouri and California utilized 100+ stations, 80+ mail deliverymen, and 400+ horses, and allowed mail sent from Missouri to reach California in under 13 days.
- 19. **U.S. Civil War** (1861-1865) The Civil War started over the demand of states' rights to slavery, as recorded in the Confederate States Constitution, Ordinances of Secession, and Declaration of Cause.
- 20. **Homestead Act** (1862) President Abraham Lincoln's act allowed 160 acres of government land to be bought for \$18, accelerating the settlement of the west.
- 21. **Transcontinental Railroad** (1863-1869) The 1862 Pacific Railroad Act provided land and limited financing to the Central Pacific and the Union Pacific railroad companies to link the eastern and western halves of America.

- 22. Black Hills Gold Rush (1874-1876) Increasing rumors of Black Hills gold following General Custer's expedition to the Dakota Territory drew vast numbers of trespassing prospectors to land that belonged to the Sioux and Cheyenne Nations.
- 23. Great Sioux War (Black Hills War) of 1876 The discovery of gold in the Black Hills was used to excuse war against local Native Americans, forcing them off their land.
- 24. **The Dawes Act/General Allotment Act** (1887) President Grover Cleveland stripped tribal land from Native Americans, then allotted some land back to those willing to become U.S. citizens. Remaining tribal lands were sold to non-native, white settlers.
- 25. Western frontier is "closed" (1890) The Census Bureau Superintendent said that the 1890 census reflected an absence of a frontier line (a population density of less than 2 people per square mile) and declared the Western frontier to be "closed."

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
