Fred Lockley (1871–1958)

A Prolific Chronicler of Early Oregon Social and Political History

The social history surrounding genealogical records not only informs our research but is also interesting in and of itself. Fred Lockley was an author and newspaper man. He wrote the book *History of the Columbia River Valley from the Dalles to the Sea*.

He also published two documents written by others that preserved early Oregon Country history. One is a small pamphlet **"To Oregon by Ox-Team in '47,"** and one is the document **"The Organizational Journal of an Emigrant Train of 1845, Captained by**

Solomon Tetherow."

The journal is a fascinating record that details the constitution document that was crafted for the journey of the wagon train. It also lists the wagon train's executive committee, a census of the

> emigrants including their stores of food, and much more information. Those who research wagon train pioneers know how rare this surviving information is. The **GFO library** has these publications.

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The Q Review SIG Discusses Strategies for Sharing Information on Enslaved Persons

At the August meeting, the Q Review examined Nicole Gilkinson LaRue's article, "A Woman of Many Names: Henrietta Dixon of Baltimore, Maryland," NGSQ 108 (Sep 2020), p. 183–193. The article was relatable as it covered types of research problems many of us deal with, such as many reported surnames, people with the same name, and the difficulty of researching Black families pre-1870.

As part of the discussion, many participants remarked on how important it is to share any information about enslaved persons you may find in your research. **Reclaiming Kin** is a great resource for learning more about researching slavery and **what to do with information you uncover**.

Reparations4Slavery has a section on **Reparative Genealogy**. The site has lists of Facebook groups, articles, videos, websites, and advice for sharing information about enslaved persons and connecting with their descendants.

Please contribute your findings to these platforms. You could help another researcher find a clue to where an enslaved ancestor lived and who they were.



terly for documenting information about formerly enslaved people in Oregon. These articles are available at JSTOR: *Oregon Historical Quarterly* on JSTOR.²

An article he authored, published in June 1922, records the remarkable case of Robin Holmes versus Nathaniel Ford. Nathaniel Ford had been the enslaver of the Holmes family in Missouri and brought the family with him to Oregon in 1844. Holmes went to court in 1852 to sue for the freedom of his children (two of whom were born in Oregon). Holmes prevailed, but it required four affidavits and ten witnesses.³

What Lockley was best known for was his column, "Impressions and Observations of the Journal Man," which ran in the *Oregon Journal* newspaper. Lockley interviewed more than 10,000 people in his career mostly in Oregon but also in France and England during World War I.⁴

In 1981, three collections of his columns were compiled and edited by Mike Helm and printed in book form. These books all come from **The Fred Lockley Papers** held at the University of Oregon Library. The books are *Conversations with Pioneer Women*, *Conversations with Pioneer Men*, and *Visionaries, Mountain Men and Empire Builders*. There are three older, un-indexed collections of columns, *Oregon Folks* (1927), *Oregon's Yesterdays* (1928), and *Oregon Trail Blazers* (1929). The GFO library has all of



these books, except the last one, which is available at the Multnomah County Library. Most are also available for purchase, used, from various sellers.

Lockley's generous interviewing style really allowed the voices of his subjects to come through. *Conversations with Pioneer Women* is particularly interesting. This oral history collection includes

women's recollections that vary from terse, factual retellings of day-to-day pioneer life to vivid descriptions of the journey, family members, and Oregon.



Results from the Educational Survey

At the request of the Education Committee, a month-long survey was generated to learn more about current educational interests, as well as feelings regarding online or in-person education.

Paid Seminars—Timing

When asked preferences regarding the timing of a paid seminar, just over 50% chose a single half- to three-quarterday event, 31% would like two to four shorter sessions spread over a month, and slightly more than 12% were interested in a weekend event.

In-person versus Online





190,000 FamilySearch volunteers reviewed the indexing of the 1950 US Census, and the complete census index of 151 million people will be available to search very soon. Many states (including Oregon) are already complete.
