New Year Message from the Acting President

The GFO saw many changes in 2021, and through it all, GFO is going strong. Every day, work is done to fulfill GFO's mission of providing resources, education, and community.

The Board of Directors works cooperatively for the good of the organization. Committee chairs and the volunteers who partner with them continue to sustain GFO with a staggering number of volunteer hours. Dedicated special interest group leaders offer excellent virtual gatherings for GFO members and nonmembers alike-keeping us all connected.

In November, GFO's first interactive indexing event took place on GivingTuesday. Not only were two marriage books indexed, the Data Extraction Committee, under the leadership of Loretta Welsh, gained twenty new members!

In December, we proudly announced that in 2021, more than 500,000 pages of genealogical content was added to GFO's Member-Space, and we're well on our way to one million. What does 2022 look like for the GFO?

Finances

GFO is in good financial health but we need your help to maintain that status. GFO's Annual Appeal was launched in November. So far, we have raised \$18,705.86. If we don't reach our goal of \$30,000, GFO has reserves we can use to cover the shortfall. Of course, it's better if we don't need to pull funds from our reserves. CONTINUED ON PAGE 2



A Year of Celebrating our Special Interest Groups

One of the wonderful services that GFO provides to the community are our Special Interest Groups (SIGs), and this year, *The Forum Insider* will feature one or two of those groups each issue.

SIGs are free groups open to members and nonmembers alike. They meet virtually to discuss different areas of genealogical interest. At this time, there are 16 active Special Interest Groups. Some groups meet monthly, and others meet at less frequent intervals.

SIG meetings are listed on the online *GFO calendar*. The calendar lists the meeting date and time, usually a description of that month's meeting, and a link or email address to register for the meeting. This month, we highlight the DNA and French Canada Ancestry groups.

DNA SIG

The DNA Special Interest Group is designed to assist researchers in understanding how DNA can augment their genealogy. There are two levels that alternate throughout the year: Beginners Group focuses on those who need a basic understanding or a review and is managed by Emily Aulicino. The goal is to get everyone to the advanced level. The Advanced Group is run by Tim Janzen and goes beyond the basics. However, we realize that some people are in the middle or are interested in a topic offered by either group. Therefore, anyone is welcome at either class, regardless of level.


The purpose of the French Canada SIG is to share resources for doing our genealogical research, the history and culture of our ancestors who settled in French Canada including Acadia, to share connections among us and linkages in our common heritage, to break through walls in our individual and collective research, to entertain outside speakers to share all of the above, and above all, to have fun and share the joy of our shared identity.

In a typical meeting, we have 15–20 in attendance, and the format changes depending on the topic. We have meeting topics chosen in advance and always have an open sharing session in combination with the topic at hand. We also always make time for discussing new research tools or resources.

One very special aspect of our group is the fact that all or nearly all of us are related to one degree or another, sometimes many times over and usually as distant (or sometimes not-so-distant) cousins. Finding these family connections is probably unique to this SIG as the original settlers intermarried among a small core group of early settlers in the 17th century. We enjoy these relationships, as well as learning in a tangible way what brought our ancestors to North America, how they lived, struggled, and overcame hardship, and how we can remember and honor them.

At the GFO Open House, Carol LaBrie and Kristy Musali will share what they have learned about the indigenous peoples that were in the area of Quebec early in the 17th century and 18th century.




January 2022



GivingTuesday Virtual Event Fun and Fruitful

The idea for GivingTuesday began in 2012 in New York to promote community and philanthropy, and this year's GFO virtual event accomplished both. In the past, the GFO held in-house GivingTuesday parties, completing projects in the library. However, in 2020 the event was canceled due to the pandemic. Acting President Laurel Smith did not want a repeat in 2021. She dreamed of a virtual GivingTuesday. Using her vision, a dedicated team of volunteers organized a marriage-themed event to index marriage records from Multnomah County. The records are available at the GFO, but without an index, they were not easy to use.

Virtual GivingTuesday was a delightful success. There were inevitable technical challenges, but all volunteers those running the event and those who came to index handled the challenges with humor and patience. As a result, seventy-five participants indexed 935 pages! But more than that, it was a lovely day connecting with our community. There was laughter and stories, collaboration and camaraderie. We thank all the people who joined us.

- 1,870 marriages indexed

Oregon Historical Society's Research Library Is Now Open to Researchers by Appointment

The Oregon Historical Society reopened its research library in October after an extensive two-year renovation. OHS research library has the "largest collection of Oregon-related archival and published materials, documenting the people, places, and events that have shaped the history of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest. These materials include books, manuscripts, oral histories and sound recordings, films and moving images, and photographs..."

The OHS research library is a vital resource for Oregon genealogists and its closure was a notable absence these



past two years. The new space is designed to be a welcoming, flexible environment that serves the needs of the many different types of library users.

The research library is open by appointment only and capacity is limited to 25% due to the continuing pandemic.

The Secretary is responsible for taking meeting minutes and collecting monthly reports. We welcome an organized volunteer with the ability to respond regularly to email.



Family Relationships Revealed With Google News Archive

Many genealogists know that Google has digitized thousands of newspapers as far back as the eighteenth century, which can be browsed at <u>news.google.com/newspapers</u>. Each issue can be accessed individually but not searched. This is fine for searching a specific date, but not ideal for searching over years. Furthermore, the interface is cumbersome.

The Bend Genealogical Society published some exciting news in their December 2021 newsletter. The News Archive can be searched using Google Books. Following their instructions, I located a funeral notice for my ancestor, naming a relative I had not known about and confirming a long-held theory.


My ancestor, Hugh Logan, lived and was buried in New York City, but he died in Newburgh, New York, some 70 miles away. My working theory was that he had relations in Newburgh, but my documentation into this family line is sparse and the name is common. I did, however, have Hugh's last known address before death: 677 East 160th Street, New York. Imagine my excitement at netting an article with the known address but unknown relations! My unsubstantiated theories had included the McCoys, but I had no inkling of Isaac Brown. This small article will be key to my continuing research plan. Functal of Hugh Logan. The funeral service over the remains of Hugh Logan, who died in this city, were held to-day at hus late residence, 677 East 160th street, New York. Mr. Logan was a painter and decorator, and was a brother in-law of Isaac Brown and of James Mc-Coy of this city. He was in ill health and went to Marlborough a few days ago. From Marlborough a came to this city, where he died of nervous prostralast Sunday evening at nine o'clock, at the residence of Mr. McCoy, at 132 Johnston street. Mr. Logan is survived by a wife and several adult children.

How to Search the News Archive Through Google Books

1. Start at *books.google.com*. The search box uses the same search tools as regular Google search. This means you should be able to use the same search operators, bearing in mind possible limits of OCR (optical character recognition). For example, quotation marks will search for the words inside the quotation marks together. An asterisk will

allow for other words between your search parameters. I tested this by searching "Third Battery * Field Artillery", and articles that mentioned both "Third Battery Field Artillery" and "Third Battery of the Field Artillery" were located.

2. Once you have your search returns, you can limit your search to newspapers by using the drop-down menu below the search bar.

Historical Context Informs Family Identification

For the December meeting, the Q Review discussed Ruth Randall's article, "Discovering Kin for Washington Graham of Arkansas and Missouri" NGSQ 109 (Sep 2021), p. 165–174.

The group appreciated the amount of historical context provided, especially regarding the service of the U.S. Colored Troops. The Acts of Congress and General Orders from the Adjutant General's office were fascinating to read!

Participants questioned the reliability of some sources specifically, in the third part of footnote 26, a former enslaver's account of the marriage practices of the enslaved is cited. Can a narrative from this perspective possibly be accurate? Some wondered if that source really added anything to the information from the other sources used.

The study group felt the author's conclusion was strongly supported by logical reasoning from strong evidence. In addition, the conclusion was strengthened by a bulleted list of facts that demonstrated the correlations between different pieces of indirect evidence. For our next meeting at 6 p.m. PT on
