Irish Group Special Announcement


In March, the newly-revived Irish Special Interest Group (SIG) began its bimonthly meetings. That first meeting was well attended, with over two dozen interested participants. Researchers ranged from those who were just beginning to investigate their Irish ancestors to those who are specialists in all things Irish genealogy. A second meeting occurred in June, continuing the every-other-third-Wednesday schedule.



The group's purpose is to provide encouragement and education while sharing the joys and tribulations of researching Irish ancestors. Although all of the island of Ireland is included, the primary focus is the genealogical research of the Republic of Ireland, also known as the Irish Free State, Éire, Ireland, and Southern Ireland.

All members of the GFO, as well as their guests and any interested members of the public, are welcome to attend the Irish Genealogy SIG. One hour of each two-hour meeting is spent on presentations about Irish history, genealogy, and resources. The second hour focuses on Irish brick wall questions.

Over the past year and a half there have been significant changes to the GFO website. The new website that launched in January 2017 was an entirely new platform. A more recent change took place in February 2018. It was more cosmetic and was required by our website host provider. Our goals as we worked through both sets of changes included:

- Ø Online registrations, orders, and membership payments;
- () Improved access to our site's content on mobile devices; and
- \wp As-needed updates to the site by a larger group of volunteers.



Feedback from members and volunteers indicate these goals have been largely met. It has been a learning process, and we still receive suggestions for improvements, which we often implement. In addition, there is a list of behind-the-scenes changes that we continue to work on.


That being said, we would like to share a few tips for using the website based on a recent inquiry sent to <u>info@gfo.org</u>.

Tip 1) Stop the scrolling images – the home screen has changing images that showcase upcoming events. To stop the scrolling, hover the mouse over the image.



Tip 2) Size matters – the location of the dropdown menus changes with the size of the screen. This is typical of websites that work on a variety of platforms. Laptops and desktop computers show a series of tabs across the top of the screen that open dropdown menus.

Tip 3) Still can't find what you need – use the

custom search box in the top left corner of the page. Type a word or name in the search box and get a list of suggestions. Click on one and it will open in a new tab or window.

This works for finding all sorts of things on the site. Marriage records – the first two of many:

Tip 4) Search the library catalog – the custom search box shown above searches only the GFO website. If you are searching for a book, microfilm, or other analog item within our physical library holdings, make sure to look in our online library catalog.

You can get there through the dropdown menu items under "Resources"—"Research Library"—"Search the Catalog." Type your search terms into the library catalog search box or click the big "Search" button that is directly below the same search box. This will take you directly to our online library catalog with all your search results ready to be explored.

Tip 5) Propose a change – Here is a great example of how our wonderful webmasters have worked to solve a recent problem. When ordering a record online (for some reason this happened most often with marriage records requests), some users were finding that the website wouldn't process their payment. Instead, an error message appeared stating, "Total amount \$ field could not be validated."

Turns out some users were putting the "\$" into the payment amount box, but the website will process only numerical figures in that box. Because of the feedback from our users, our webmasters have added a line below the payment box that reads, "*Do not use the \$ symbol.*" Your input really does make a difference.

We know there are still a few pages that could be more user friendly. If you come across one, please let us know. There are thousands of pages on the site and none of us has looked at all of them. If you have a suggestion, please contact us at <u>info@gfo.org</u> or <u>webmaster@gfo.org</u>.

An Adopted Family Tree

A single act of kindness throws out roots in all directions, and the roots spring up and make new trees. ~Amelia Earhart


Being asked to do a family tree project in school, for me, was like having to go to the doctor. As an adopted foster kid, I am bonded with other adoptees across the globe by one single line; "*I don't know, I was adopted.*" Like our medical history, our family tree is unknown.

My adopted family tree was made up of people I felt grateful for, however, I didn't look like them. Loyalty replaced a sense of belonging or connection. To me, at the time, my family tree represented my childhood struggles more than anything else. Then, my grandma turned it all around for me. She made a painful school project into a fun history lesson, which sparked my love for history and genealogy.

To put this into perspective, my grandma was born in 1909, a first-generation immigrant whose family came from the rural country life of Ireland. She understood my struggles with identity, and I understood her stories of survival. The family tree project was no longer about my identity or where I came from. The focus was about the stories and places on the tree, rather than just the names. My family tree became a whole forest of stories. My association to my family tree was formed through a historical perspective. For me as an adoptee, this made all the emotions and feelings of loss manageable. The tree no longer represented my identity as being adopted through relinquishment; instead the tree outlined the history of the people I lived with.


My family tree turned into a life lesson at a young age. All the stories in my tree involved two choices. Through the stories of those in my family tree, I learned about people who took the high road and looked beyond themselves, changing lives; sometimes even changing history. And then, I also learned about people who took the easy way. Through these stories, my grandma made my family tree project come back around full circle, and it again was all about my identity. Who did I want to be in life? What would people find when they researched my name someday in a family tree? Where we as adoptees come from plays a huge part in our journey, but more importantly are the choices we make while on the journey.





Book Forward – Serendipity Moment

The following forward was found in a GFO library book recently being cataloged. We wanted to share this with you, as the following applies to many extracted and indexed genealogical records. This piece has been reprinted with the author's express permission.



There are of course errors in this compilation. The census is an interpretation of what the person thought his parents had told him about what his name was and where he and they were born, what the census taker thought he heard him say about those things, fairly close to what he actually intended to write down, what I thought he meant and what I thought I saw that he had written, and finally what my typewriter saw fit to put down – you have played the game of "gossip" before, right?

You will find that some women age six to twelve years in twenty, but then what's wrong with that? Often times on the 1880 census, the places of birth for the parents are turned around or are wrong completely. I have placed an asterisk after names that I filled in from other sources and couldn't read on the original census.

The spelling of a particular name, though it may not agree with your records, is probably consistent with the census taker – if he spells Elisabeth with the "s," he will all the time. One spelled Anna consistently as Enna which is not to be confused with a misspelled Emma. However, if a family was continued on a following page, half the time he spelled the surname differently on the two pages. And you must remember that it was permissible to ask the nextdoor neighbor about a family not at home.

It is a record about people, and some of it is rather funny – some rather sad. The mortality schedules reports all those infants and young mothers who died much too young. The census taker reported in one place he didn't know where a certain young man's parents were born because "he had skadaddled." In another place he found not just a wife, but a "disgusted wife," and in yet another he found an "old lady unsettled but there for a long visit."

I have many documented corrections to these records and would be happy to have anyone write who has questions or corrections. I do research free for anyone who will share records on families who have been in Taylor County.

Library Committee Chair, Laurel Smith, comments, "Despite this being written by a woman living in Iowa in 1976, I was shocked to find that I know her! On a research trip to Iowa a few years ago, Pat escorted me to two cemeteries way out in the country—and she took the brunt of a yellow jacket attack from the residents in one of the iron cemetery gates. Pat also guided me to the Nodaway Valley Historical Museum, and she has provided some ongoing research information about the area.

"I wrote to ask her permission to reprint the book forward text, to which she quickly responded:

Laurel you are certainly welcome to reprint that. It's all so true - so very true. I've been working to compile the death certificate info on Page and Taylor counties, 1921-1940, and I could say all those things again about these death certificates. No one should believe what's on those death records and they should realize that the guy filling them in always wrote Elizebeth, Sameul, Micheal, Margeret. Lycurgus. He could spell, but common names he consistently mutilated."

To which Laurel says, "So true!"

Atkinson Marriage 1813

Sound advice: always go back to the online databases that you've previously checked for records. New information is being added every day.

For example, I've been looking for over 20 years for the 1813 marriage record of my Quaker ancestors Samuel Atkinson and Mary Garwood in Mullica Hill, Gloucester County, New Jersey. They would have gone to the meeting house located there, but according to sources at the church, the records were stolen for that time period. Swarthmore College, the repository for Quaker documents, could not find any written evidence of the marriage. Samuel and Mary relocated to Monroe County, Michigan, in 1827, where Samuel was known as the "Quaker" and Mary was known to always wear her white cap.

This past year, my nephew was searching on familysearch.org and came upon a marriage for Samuel "Atkison" and Mary Garwood taking place in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at the historic St. Michael's and Zion Church. The record referenced <u>Ancestry.com</u> where he found an image of the actual church book entry. Why they were not married as Quakers is a mystery, but it was a great find.


